



#### What Is a Beach?


Beaches are always found next to a stretch of water, such as the sea or a lake. Usually, they are composed of rock which could be in the form of sand, pebbles, gravel or shingle.

At some beaches, there is a high and low tide. This means that at certain points of the day, the sea comes further up the beach. On some beaches,


at times, the sea completely covers it.


#### Attractions in London

the views.




## National Gallery




